## **ACTION PLAN FOR**



Anapnylaxis
For use with EpiPen® adrenaline (epinephrine) autoinjectors
SIGNS OF MILD TO MODERATE ALLERGIC REACTION
Swelling of lips, face, eyes     Hives or welts     Abdominal pain, vomiting - these are signs of anaphylaxis for insect allergy
ACTION FOR MILD TO MODERATE ALLERGIC REACTION
For insect allergy - flick out sting if visible For tick allergy seek medical help or freeze tick and let it drop off Stay with person, call for help and locate adrenaline autoinjector Give antihistamine (if prescribed) Phone family/emergency contact
Mild to moderate allergic reactions (such as hives or swelling) may not always occur before anaphylaxis
WATCH FOR ANY ONE OF THE FOLLOWING SIGNS OF
ANAPHYLAXIS (SEVERE ALLERGIC REACTION)
<ul> <li>Difficult or noisy breathing</li> <li>Swelling of tongue</li> <li>Swelling or tightness in throat</li> <li>Wheeze or persistent cough</li> <li>Difficulty talking or hoarse voice</li> <li>Persistent dizziness or collapse</li> <li>Pale and floppy (young children)</li> </ul>
ACTION FOR ANAPHYLAXIS
LAY PERSON FLAT - do NOT allow them to stand or walk     If unconscious or pregnant, place in recovery position     - on left side if pregnant, as shown below     If breathing is difficult allow them to sit with legs outstretched     Hold young children flat, not upright
2 GIVE ADRENALINE AUTOINJECTOR 3 Phone ambulance - 000 (AU) or 111 (NZ) 4 Phone family/emergency contact 5 Further adrenaline may be given if no response after 5 minutes 6 Transfer person to hospital for at least 4 hours of observation

EpiPen® is prescribed as follows:

- EpiPen® Jr (150 mcg) for children 7.5-20kg
- EpiPen® (300 mcg) for children over 20kg and adults
- 6 Transfer person to hospital for at least 4 hours of observation
- IF IN DOUBT GIVE ADRENALINE AUTOINJECTOR

Commence CPR at any time if person is unresponsive and not breathing normally

ALWAYS GIVE ADRENALINE AUTOINJECTOR FIRST, and then asthma reliever puffer if someone with known asthma and allergy to food, insects or medication has SUDDEN BREATHING DIFFICULTY (including wheeze, persistent cough or hoarse voice) even if there are no skin symptoms Asthma reliever medication prescribed: Y

Note: If adrenaline is accidentally injected (e.g. into a thumb) phone your local poisons information centre. Continue to follow this action plan for the person with the allergic reaction.

	LAY PERSON FLAT - do NOT allow them to stand or walk     If unconscious or pregnant, place in recovery position





PULL OFF BLACK NEEDLE SHIELD

PULL OFF GREY SAFETY CAP from red buttor





PLACE NEEDLE END FIRMLY against outer mid-thigh at 90° angle (with or without clothing)

PRESS RED BUTTON so it clicks and hold for 10 seconds. REMOVE Anapen®

Anapen® is prescribed as follows:

- Anapen® 150 Junior for children 7.5-20kg
- Anapen® 300 for children over 20kg and adults
- Anapen® 500 for children and adults over 50kg
